Note: A grade point average of C (2.00) is required in the major, with no course grade below a C- (1.70) in courses counting towards the major. Also note that many 200-level and 300-level Economics courses require a C- or better grade in the prerequisite courses. ECON 270, ECON 271, and ECON 272 do not count as 200-level electives.

Even though MATH 211: Calculus I (or equivalent) is not a major requirement, it is a prerequisite for ECON 271: Microeconomic Theory. Students are encouraged to take MATH 211 (or equivalent) during their freshman year.

Students interested in economics graduate school, in addition to the departmental honors sequence, are also strongly recommended to take MATH 212, MATH 235, MATH 245, MATH 300, MATH 312, MATH 320, MATH 329, and the ECON 300 and ECON 370 electives.
