Spring 2025 Economics Course Offerings

Special Topics Courses in Spring 2025:

Behavioral and Experimental Economics, **Econ 259**, Mondays & Wednesdays at 10:30 am and noon. Taught by: Dr. Neeraja Gupta

This course counts as a 200-level Economics elective for all majors, minors, or concentrations that require such an elective. Prerequisite: Econ 101 and BUAD 202 or equivalent. Course description: This course introduces students to key topics in behavioral economics, with a focus on experimental methods. Behavioral economics blends economics and psychology to examine the decision-making processes of economic agents and the systematic ways in which they deviate from rationality. Students will explore the causes and consequences of these deviations using theoretical, empirical, and experimental evidence. By the end of the course, students will generate a research question on economic behavior, conduct a literature review, and design an experiment to test their proposed question.

Inequality, Econ 359, Tuesdays & Thursdays at 10:30 am. Taught by: Dr. Andrea Waddle

This course counts as a 300-level Economics elective for all majors, minors, or concentrations that require such an elective. Prerequisite: Econ 270. Course description: In this course, we explore the causes and implications of inequality across demographic groups within the United States. We explore the different ways that inequality can be defined and measured and use data to understand how incomes and wealth differ across race, gender, and educational groups and how these relationships have been changing over time. We put these trends into international context, by comparing cross-group inequality across countries and use differences in outcomes across countries to understand what policies may help ameliorate the trend of growing inequality.
